conomic development, sustainable mobility, local embeddedness, social innovation, housing: to name a few major topics that pertain to cities and their inhabitants. But they are not the sole and exclusive domain of city authorities. Nowadays cities, higher education institutions, businesses and citizens cooperate to obtain the best results for high quality urban life. But how to do so in an effective way?

European network + URBACT project

With this question in mind, the EUniverCities Network was launched in January 2012: a network of city-university tandems that want to learn from each other on how to improve their co-operation. The network currently has 17 members and observers from all over Europe: Aachen, Aalborg, Delft, Gent, Lausanne, Linköping, Lublin, Magdeburg, Norrköping, Parma, Reykjavik, Tampere, Terrassa, Toulouse, Trondheim, Varna and Zaragoza. The network is still growing, as city-university partnership is a key topic for many European cities, universities and the European Commission alike.

After setting up the network, the City of Delft successfully filed an application under the 3rd URBACT Call for Proposals, collaborating with nine other cities in– and outside the network. The URBACT project gives impetus to the process of learning and exchanging between cities and their universities.

Riding on tandems

In EUniverCities, local authorities and their universities act as tandems. The concept is to work together and meet regularly locally, preferably institutionalizing cooperation at different levels. When meeting with other European peers opinions and views may still differ. EUniverCities shows how acting as tandems helps create a better mutual understanding, overcome differences and work on common dossiers.

Let's meet and learn!

Technology, innovation, entrepreneurship are key fields for universities and cities alike. Other important fields of common interest are students & city life, joint city marketing and promoting science in society.

In our meetings, we exchange experiences and learn about new developments and concepts, via presentations, debates and excursions. A particular feature of the EUniverCities "way of working" is Peer Review: sessions in which policies and initiatives of the host city are presented and critically reviewed by the visiting members. This method supports the host city to develop new insights and appropriate policy measures. All European actors learn from each other and go home with fresh ideas. The added value of the URBACT Programme is the creation of a Local Support Group (ULSG) in each member city: local platforms where relevant

stakeholders discuss important project developments on a local and European level. They pave the way for the implementation of new ideas.


